LOCATION

In a room



DURATION

35 minutes



LEVEL OF DIFFICULTY

Moderate

OBJECTIVE OF THE ACTIVITY

To help children understand what a tick looks like.

INSTRUCTIONS

Make a tick like the illustration of the *Crafty Tick*.

- Using scissors:
 - cut 2 pipe cleaners in 4 equal parts for the 8 legs.
 - cut 1 pipe cleaner into 2 small pieces for the mouthparts.
- Using brown paint, paint the Styrofoam ball (oval shape is preferred).
- When the brown paint dries, paint a black oval to represent the dorsal shield.
- Insert four pipe cleaners on each side of the black oval to represent the legs.
- Insert two small pieces of pipe cleaner at the tip of the Styrofoam ball to represent the mouthparts.

MATERIALS



- Illustration of the *Crafty Tick*
- Photo of a blacklegged tick

Per child:

- 1 Styrofoam ball (oval shape preferred)
- 3 Black pipe cleaners
- Black paint
- Brown paint
- Paintbrush
- Scissors



BEFORE YOU START

Provide the illustration of the *Crafty Tick* and describe the different parts of the tick:

- Abdomen
- Dorsal shield
- 8 legs (same family as spiders)
- Mouthparts

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Explain that:

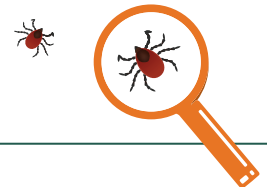
- When a tick bites, it attaches to your skin to feed on blood.
- It is important to have an adult remove it with clean, fine-point tweezers.
- They should grasp the head of the tick as close to the skin as possible and pull slowly.
- They should try not to twist or squeeze the tick when removing it.
